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Global challenges/provocative questions

- Are children being turned into vectors of violence, rather than zones of tranquility?
- Can children be 'immunised against violence'?
- Can we help make non-violence an aspiration for children?

[Bring together various references (Conventions, platforms) addressing children, women and violence. In summary: right to freedom from fear].

Identifying key transformations needed

- How do societies regard violence? What permits violence to occur?
 - Socially acceptable forms of violence
 - Socially unacceptable forms of violence

[Violence in war and armed conflict, in the family, sexual violence, violence and gender issues (models of masculinity and femininity), political violence, violence and social status, related to resource disparity/basic needs, as a form of problem-solving, verbal violence, violence in the media, violence and authority...]

- How do societies regard non-violence?
 - Associated with positive or negative role models? With spirituality and reconciliation? Consistent with the folk image of the society?

Where is UNICEF's role?

- In underlining that violence always impedes the child's development to his/her fullest potential.
- In addressing the causes and expressions of violence against children and women through programmatic interventions.

[Entry points might include: with *adolescents*, addressing violence and status issues, and developing one's own identity; with *ECCD*, questions of violence and child survival; breaking cycles of violence within families; socialisation of boys and girls; education for conflict resolution; with different forms of *children's participation*, their aspirations vis-à-vis violence; promoting the concepts of human interdependence and working together; gender equality; with *armed conflict*, preventing child recruitment; working for demobilisation and reintegration; for ratification of the landmines convention & related educational initiatives; broadening our own range of interlocutors; supporting the current anti-small arms trade initiative.

Programme/advocacy strategies

1. Preventing violence against children and women by
 - Strengthening its social unacceptability (principally among men and boys, at community level)
 - Encouraging 'self-help' skills for women, children and men
 - [Promoting steps to strengthen the family as a source of stability – e'g' improved provision of childcare]
 - Pursuing an antiwar agenda
 - Promoting legislation which criminalizes violence against women and children and eliminates inequitable extenuating circumstances
2. Providing shelter from violence
 - Drop-in centres/alternatives for children scared to return home
 - Researching loci of violence (family, police stations, against marginalized)
3. Addressing consequences of violence
 - Addressing PTSD and psychosocial needs
 - Promoting (e.g.) medical 'entry points' to individual victims, leading to counselling and legal action
 - Seeking legal redress mechanisms which are accessible to women and children
