They were the scheme for the care and protection of destitute children and the provision of crèches to the children of working and ailing women, both of which were run by voluntary organizations and 90 per cent of which were funded by the Government.

Each village Panchayat of about 2,000 to 4,000 inhabitants recruited a full-time multipurpose village health worker, trained by the Ministry of Health to carry out basic health services such as family planning, immunization, nutrition, first aid, training of traditional birth attendants, etc. That had been fully incorporated into Nepal's long-term health plan as the priority programme.

51. Nepal was grateful to UNICEF for supporting the activities of the integrated basic health service. It was especially grateful to UNICEF for supporting the expanded immunization programme (EPI) which had been jointly developed by national as well as international experts such as WHO, USAID and UNICEF. That programme was now being implemented in accordance with jointly approved EPI procedures. However, the representative of Nepal recalled that while implementing that expanded immunization programme in six integrated districts of Nepal, UNICEF had been initially somewhat reluctant to provide disposable syringes for the DPT vaccination programme as recommended by the jointly developed EPI programme. However, they had kindly supported Nepal's EPI mass vaccination programme for DPT, with disposable syringes for children under five. She urged the multilateral and bilateral donor agencies to be more sympathetic to the jointly agreed basic technologies such as disposable syringes, cold chain equipment, vaccines etc., which were critical factors in ensuring simple, basic but effective services to the maximum number of children and so enabling them to survive the health hazards of early childhood.

52. Management of a complicated project such as the integrated health programme to meet the technical standards of each concerned vertical health programme, such as family planning and malaria, etc., was a complex task technically as well as administratively. Therefore a more sympathetic approach was required from multilateral and bilateral agencies in assisting the integrated health programme. For instance, for UNICEF to demand a separate accounting system for cash grants, in addition to Government accounting procedures, complicated the management further. These bureaucratic procedures diluted many useful programmes. She therefore appealed to UNICEF to reconsider its demand for a separate accounting system and to integrate it with the systems of concerned Governments and so rely on the report of the Auditor General of each respective Government. That would greatly enhance the management of integrated basic service.

Paragraph 6

Replace the paragraph by the following text:

6. Mr. HOAN (Socialist Republic of Viet Nam) said that before a member of his delegation, who was a specialist on the subject, introduced the working paper of the Central Committee for the Protection of Mother and Child of the Socialist Republic of Viet Nam (E/ICEF/ASIA/12), he would like to make a few comments on his Government's general policy with regard to children, thus showing the context in which that paper had been prepared. As a result of more than a century of colonial domination and 30 years of almost uninterrupted warfare Viet Nam was, from the economic standpoint, a poor and backward developing country. Nevertheless, his Government, even during the war years, had consistently attached great importance to basic services for children, and although much remained to be done, its efforts to promote child welfare and education had produced encouraging results. Children represented the future of the country and because of their physical vulnerability required special care; indeed, children in Viet Nam were the most privileged population group. Furthermore, in accordance with State policy, it was the duty of every citizen to help ensure that children were adequately nourished and educated. Assistance provided by the population in the form of labour and material had often made it possible to overcome difficulties caused by a lack of funds or equipment. The Government also wanted to ensure that children benefited from the basic services appropriate to their respective age groups. For instance, every child from the age of two months to three years should, ideally, have a place in a crèche, and every child three to six years of age should attend a nursery school; efforts were being directed towards those goals.

Mrs. TAM (Socialist Republic of Viet Nam) replied that the Central Committee for the Protection of Mother and Child was a government department responsible for the study of child protection policy and the presentation of that policy to the Council of State; the organization, management, direction and implementation of guidelines, policies and activities related to the protection of children; scientific research on the rearing and education of children; diffusion of child rearing and education techniques to mothers and the population generally. Major programmes and activities were always discussed with the Women's Association and

after arriving at a consensus, the Association motivated its members to implement them through such activities as, for example, constructing, equipping and supply supplying crèches and planting fruit trees. The Association always gave its opinions to the Central Committee for the Protection of Mother and Child on all matters related to policies concerning children.

19. In reply to a question from Dr. Zahra (World Health Organization) related to family health, she indicated that, except in the south where the primary health care network had not yet been fully developed, every village now had a communal health centre, which included a pediatric unit responsible for the immunization and treatment of children. In cities, an individual health follow-up booklet was issued for each baby immediately after delivery. Children in the home were covered by the communal health centre and those in crèches were cared for by the nurses and crèche staff. Immediately after birth, babies had to be registered at the communal health centre, where they underwent periodic examinations; they also received home treatment in cases of sickness not requiring hospitalization.

After the first sentence insert the following text:

To alleviate poverty, services had to be provided within easy reach of the rural poor. Their human skills would have to be upgraded to enable them to take full advantage of those services, otherwise the services would fail to filter down to them and, like the Green Revolution, would benefit others instead of the poor. The inadequacy of the services was accentuated by the lack of human skills in the rural poor. Unfortunately, services for the poor organized through government agencies in developing countries were usually inadequate, inefficient and irresponsible. Since UNICEF suffered from the handicap of having to channel its activities, by and large, through government agencies, it could not produce the desired results. It should, therefore, take a lead in integrating the activities of the United Nations family and the other international development agencies, with a view to impressing upon the Governments of developing countries the absolute necessity of reorganizing government services for the poor.
